Florida Residency Conference

The Fourth Annual Florida Residency Conference (FRC) was held on May 7th and 8th, 2015 at the University of Florida College of Pharmacy. This conference has evolved in to the premier pharmacy residency conference in the state and continues to grow. Attendees procured up to 12 hours of continuing education credits. John Armistead led the opening session entitled, "Millennial Pharmacy Leadership from a Baby Boomer," which discussed strategies for the millennial generation to effectively lead in future pharmacy practice. The remainder of the conference served as a platform for 154 resident research presentations.

The highlight of the conference's first day was the presentation of the FRC Excellence in Research Award. Three PGY1 and two PGY2 residents presented their research before all conference attendees, with the opportunity to receive a commemorative plaque and a \$250 honorarium. For PGY1s, the award was given to former UF Health Shands Block student and current Lakeland Regional Health resident Juan Alberdi, who presented his research entitled, "Impact of Rapid Diagnostic PCR Technology on Therapy Optimization in Patients with Bacteremia at a Tertiary Care Hospital". The PGY2 award went to Lakeland Regional Health resident Kayla Montgomery, who presented "Impact of an Emergency Medicine Pharmacist on Time to Thrombolysis in Acute Ischemic Stroke".

Each of the four UF Health Shands PGY1 residents presented their research at the conference. These sessions were well-attended by clinical experts from all over the state. Our residents' presentations were a great success and speak to the efforts of the preceptor team during the FRC preparation process. The residents were extremely well-prepared for their presentations after these practice sessions, and once again demonstrated the overall strength of the UF Health Shands Pharmacy Residency Program.

Historically, UF Health Shands preceptors have been highly involved in moderating and coordinating the conference, and this year was certainly no different. Specifically, seven preceptors served as presentation evaluators during the course of the conference. Assistant Director Lisa Thames and Surgical ICU Clinical Specialist Abigail Antigua served on the FRC Steering Committee. Lisa will serve as the conference's Chairperson for the 2016 meeting in Tampa - Congratulations Lisa!

Director's Corner

Okay, so we all know that Ralphie will really be the man in charge, but we are excited to announce a new leadership position we are introducing for the upcoming class. After gathering feedback from residents and preceptors alike, a Chief Resident position was given the green light this year. The Chief Resident will be a PGY2 resident who has demonstrated leadership qualities throughout their PGY1 year and is dedicated to self-development as well as the development of their peers and co-residents. While interest is high this year, if in the future no PGY2 resident shows interest, the Residency Executive Committee (REC) would consider a PGY1 resident with the right qualities to fulfil job responsibilities.

Responsibilities of the Chief will include serving as the official liaison between the residents and the REC, holding regular meetings with the resident class and coordinating activities of current residents with task delegation as appropriate. Task-oriented coordination will include ASHP Midyear preparation, Orientation planning for the next resident class, as well as assisting in the scheduling of regular activities including monthly leadership journal club and quarterly Director's form with the Director of Pharmacy.

The inaugural Chief Resident will be named in August 2016 after all residents have arrived at UF Health. Interested candidates are required to submit a letter of intent and for external candidates, a letter of recommendation from their PGY1 Residency Director is also required. In addition, the candidates will meet with the Director of Pharmacy one-on-one for an informal interview. The Residency Executive Committee will vet all candidates and ultimately be responsible for naming the Chief.
